Who's on the Board

The Community Accountability Board will have a minimum of ten members.

Business owners - up to 3

Aboriginal elders - up to 3

Community members directly impacted by youth offending - up to 3

Territory Families, Housing and Communities representative

Local council representative

Department of Chief Minister and Cabinet representative

Chamber of Commerce representative

Northern Territory Police representative



What they do

- Meet quarterly.
- Consult with local people and stakeholders to represent the voice of the wider community.
- Make recommendations on community based-youth justice programs in their area.
- Provide advice to the Minister for Territory Families and Urban Housing on community sentiment and ideas for improvement.

You might be suited to join the Board if you have ideas on:

- how young offenders can repair the harm they cause with restorative actions, contributions or work with the community
- how young offenders can be given meaningful consequences that discourage reoffending
- what mentoring and development opportunities young people need to get back on track.

The Board will complement ongoing work that is already being undertaken to reduce youth crime.
